Participatory Ergonomics in the Prevention and Management of WRMSD: Engaging Workers in a Facilitated Design Process

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Worker engagement in ergonomics problem-solving seems to improve programme uptake and effectiveness. This workshop will provide various examples from a recent European realist review. The Healthy Workplace Participatory Programme (HWPP) elevates the role of frontline workers in analysing safety and health root causes, brainstorming solutions, programme design, and implementation. Successful meeting facilitation creates an environment that engages team members in idea creation and decision-making. HWPP facilitator training focuses on building facilitative leadership skills through discussion, modelling, and practising. The workshop will offer small-group practice in using a participatory process to address specific ergonomics issues selected by the groups.

- Explain why worker participation is important to the success of an occupational ergonomics programme.
- Identify behaviors that exemplify facilitative leadership to engage workers in root cause analysis and problem-solving.
- Understand the facilitators and barriers to effective group facilitation.
- Describe the tools and methods involved in facilitating a participatory intervention design process.
- Practice engaging in an occupational ergonomics design process.
